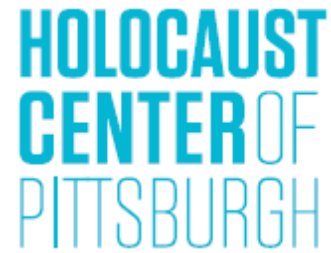

#### ABOUT THE HOLOCAUST CENTER

- Established in 1981, the Holocaust Center of Pittsburgh was created by the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh as a living memorial and a comprehensive resource center for Western Pennsylvania, Eastern Ohio, and Northern West Virginia. The organization provides education, events and programming about the Holocaust and works to help counter intolerance and hate in all its forms.

- The Center engages with other organizations, individuals and institutions to convey the contemporary relevance of the Holocaust and its lessons. It is committed to education about the events of the Holocaust, commemoration of those who suffered and triumphed, and documentation of the stories of survivors, liberators, and protectors.

#### NEW LOCATION

- In the fall of 2015, the Center relocated from its previous space within the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh offices in Oakland to a new, publicly accessible location in the East End of Pittsburgh. Permanent and visiting exhibits will include displays of the Center's collection of artifacts.
- The location is at the juncture of major roadways including Hazelwood Avenue, Beechwood Blvd., Greenfield Avenue, Browns Hill Road and I376 East. Public transportation is available via Port Authority public transit. Bus routes 61C, 61D, and 64 stop in front of the building, and the 52L, 53L, 58, 93 stop a few hundred feet away.
- The Center includes 2,300 sf. of single-floor space for exhibits, tours, education, research, remembering and understanding. A classroom accommodates up to 45 people; a memory room is designed for quiet contemplation and for experiencing stories from survivors and others. A research area with computers helps visitors explore records, testimonies and other materials.
- The lower level features 3,000 sf. of office, administrative and storage space. Architect for the new space design is Springboard Design, Pittsburgh, PA. The Holocaust Center of Pittsburgh partnered with the Urban Redevelopment Authority of Pittsburgh's Storefront Renovation Program to improve the façade of its new location and center at 826 Hazelwood Ave in Greenfield.
